

The Mission of our Continuum of Care

Ithaca/Tompkins CoC NY-510 is a local community planning network of public, private, and non-profit partners with the mission of making homelessness rare, brief, and one-time in Tompkins County.

Through this work, we:

Organize a community-wide effort to prevent and end homelessness

Provide funding and support to non-profit agencies

Promote access to supportive services and housing



ENDING HOMELESSNESS

The goal of every Continuum of Care is to build and maintain a homeless response system where experiences of homelessness are...

Rare

The community has ensured that homelessness among youth, families, single adults, veterans, and people experiencing chronic homelessness are all sustained below their functional zero threshold, which means that the actively homeless number is fewer than the six-month average of positive exits.

Brief

The average length of time from identification to move-in is 40 days or less.

One-time

Of all exits to permanent housing, no more than 5% of positive exits result in a return to the homeless system within two years of exit from the homeless system.

Equitable

The community has a demonstrated commitment and is tracking progress to reduce disparities in outcomes between groups experiencing homelessness.

CHANGES IN THE 24/25 NOFO

There are significant changes in this year's NOFO that projects should consider before applying.

Two-year NOFO

HUD has issued a single 2year NOFO for fiscal years 2024 and 2025. CoCs are only required to submit one CoC application that will be applicable to the FY2024 and FY2025 funds.

Cost of Living Adjustments

HUD is now authorized to make reasonable costs of living adjustments to renewal amounts to help afford increasing cost of operations due to inflation.

Funding for specific subpopulations


HUD requires funding reallocated from projects previously funded with YHDP or DV Bonus funding to be used for projects serving the same subpopulation. New DV Reallocation projects must be 100 percent dedicated to serving DV individuals and families.



Changes to tiering

Tier 1 is set at 90% of the CoC's Annual Renewal Demand (ARD) for this NOFO.

WHO CAN I SERVE WITH TIER 1/2 FUNDS?

HUD requires funded projects to serve households experiencing literal homelessness. This means that the individual or family must be experiencing one of the following situations.

Category 1

Sleeping:

- outside
- in a place not meant for human habitation
- in transitional housing
- in emergency shelter.

If the individual is currently institutionalized, but the stay is expected to be less than 90 days, they can be referred if they were living in one of these situations prior to the institutionalization.





Supportive Services Only- Coordinated Entry





Overview: PSH is a **non-time-limited**, **permanent** housing subsidy combined with a high level of supportive services. It is a model that is most effective when combined with a Housing First approach and is typically designed for folks with highest needs, long experiences with homelessness and a household member with a disability.

Joint Transitional Housing- Rapid Rehousing (TH-RRH/PH)

Overview: TH-RRH provides short-term crisis housing for individuals or families who enter the TH portion of the **program**. It also provides medium/long-term permanent housing for participants who transition directly from TH into RRH or from homelessness into RRH. A participant has a choice of which program they wish to access and both TH and RRH portions must be available. Many residents who have no rental history and/or multiple barriers find the support provided with TH an easier launching pad into permanent housing.

Supportive Services Only- Host Home and Kinship Care (SSO) (YHDP ONLY)

Overview: A model in which a family agrees to permit a youth to reside with them. Recognizing that the addition of another person in the home may increase costs to the family, HUD will entertain applications that propose to house youth with families and to subsidize the additional costs attributable to housing the youth. The residence is in a community-based setting. The family could be related to the youth and the length of stay may be timelimited or without time limits. YHDP funds may be used to subsidize the increased costs to the family that are attributable to housing the youth.



Cash Match

Cash counts as match only if the recipient or subrecipient can demonstrate that a payment of funds was made to cover the cost of CoC Program eligible activities expended during the grant term. • Grants from private, local, state, and federal resources (if not statutorily prohibited by source)

- Revenues from fundraising efforts organized by the recipient or subrecipient
- Recipient or subrecipient staff working on grant eligible activities who aren't paid from the CoC Program grant but are paid from other agency resources

In-Kind Match

In-kind match is the value of any real property, equipment, goods, or services contributed to a CoC Program grant that would have been an eligible CoC Program activity if the recipient or subrecipient paid for them directly with CoC Program funds. In-kind match can be donations provided directly by the recipient, subrecipient, or third party.
